

head of school



Each year I ask myself what there is about the beginning of school that causes sleepless nights and a sense of anticipation and excitement as I watch students return to school. A new school year offers faculty and students the opportunity for new beginnings. It is encouraging to observe students reconnecting with teachers and others they perhaps have not seen throughout the summer. It is also interesting to watch the introduction of new students to the Prep community. During the first few weeks of school, students are adjusting to new teachers and new assignments, and orientation activities are planned to ensure the very best experience for students.

As we begin this school year, our mission statement has been revised to answer the question: "What drives our school and what makes Jackson Prep distinctive?" After a year of study, the Board of Trustees approved a new mission statement, which was first communicated to the parent body at "Back to School Night" in August. It is concise, easy to memorize and clearly defines what must be at the forefront of decisions made about programs and activities within the school. The new mission statement is as follows, and it can also be found on our website and in all new publications of the school:

Jackson Preparatory School inspires and challenges students toward academic, athletic and artistic excellence, instills personal integrity through biblical values and equips students to pursue lives of distinction in service to society.

This mission statement:

- Reaffirms the school's commitment to excellence in every endeavor.
- Underscores the importance of biblical values and virtues in the education of our students.

- Clarifies the goal of a Prep education—to pursue a life of distinction in service to society.

Excellence: *High but achievable expectations are set for our students.* The faculty is committed to preparing all students for college and for success in life. Creating the culture where it is "cool to be smart" has been a defining characteristic of our school, and we cannot let the cynicism of some teenagers overshadow what is best for the school. We want to remain the state's standard bearer in secondary education, and achievement on national examinations affirms that position. Excellence does not mean entitlement—one is only entitled to things achieved through hard work. We will help our students see that humility and kindness are essential life skills, and these traits go hand-in-hand with perseverance and accomplishment.

Personal integrity through biblical values: *From the inception of the school, Prep has been grounded in Judeo-Christian principles.* Our founders wanted this to be a place where the historic religious foundation of Western civilization would nurture and support intellectual activity in the classrooms. Aristotle stated, "Education of the mind without educating the heart is no education at all." Prep is a moral community that has tremendous influence on students' lives. We are not a denominational school. Actually, the leadership within the school and on the Board is comprised of a mixture of denominational traditions. We welcome students of all faiths and those of no faith. Our aim is to be as ecumenical as possible while grounding the school's values in the biblical traditions—ones that resonate with the Hebrew Scriptures and the Christian Bible. We are vigorously planning and implementing a variety of initiatives with the end goal of instilling personal integrity and cultivating biblical values among our students.

Pursuing a life of distinction in service to society: *We do not learn just to become educated; we do not compete just to win. It is not all about us—we are here for others.* How do we lead students to understand this? How do we change the culture? Through education and strategic decisions, our immediate plans include helping students see a bigger world. One example is to provide community engagement among the constituents within the school, such as the environmentally-conscious Green Thumb Club, and to expose students to opportunities within the larger community. Additionally, the school is committed to development of a personal leadership program entitled "Prep for the World." The Global Leadership Institute directed by Cindy Townsend will focus on the inward look in junior high and engage students with support and a vision for their future through the high school experience. The school will be intentional in making the Prep experience more meaningful for students—we want our school to be a place where lifelong friendships are developed, where intellectual interests are piqued and where every student feels appreciated and needed.

How is this possible? All constituents of the school must be committed to the mission statement. The Jackson Prep faculty is a well-educated and talented group. Working with them, the parent body and supporters of the school, we can arm ourselves for the challenges of the culture in which we live. I am compelled to support the Prep community in this endeavor.

The 2008-2009 school year has gotten off to a wonderful start. It's always great to have students and teachers back in the buildings doing all the things they do. The beginning of the school year (as you all know well) is filled with many gatherings, forums and meetings. I would like to share a couple of things from two of these meetings.

The first is some of my opening remarks at the "Welcome to the High School" meeting with the tenth grade parents. The most important points were: 1) In the high school, we would always like the student to initiate the problem resolution process when appropriate. Problem resolution flows from teacher to counselor to head of senior high. Parents follow the same steps if the student has been unable to resolve the problem. 2) The southeast corner of the high school is populated by a group of people that support the students and faculty and interface with parents. Please take advantage of these resources and encourage your children to use them as well. Academic, personal, and college questions are just some of the areas where we have expertise.

In a second group of meetings, we discussed discipline and our collective goals of our high school community for the year. The first topic of interest was school uniforms and dress. We are hoping that new penalties and closer attention to these issues will result in the greater compliance and habituation of correct dress that is reached fairly quickly and will not require continual discussion with some students in the high school. Secondly, we spoke about the new attendance policy (refer to student guidelines for more information). As you read in Prep Notes last spring (Go to www.jacksonprep.net, click on Parents, then Read PrepNotes Online), we are serious about the education we are trying to deliver to our students. Missing classes often or for trivial reasons will be discouraged. Please consider the impact of missing school on your child when you are making decisions about activities that occur when school is in session.

All of us in the high school are looking forward to a great year. We are also looking forward to seeing all of you at the many events that involve our talented students.

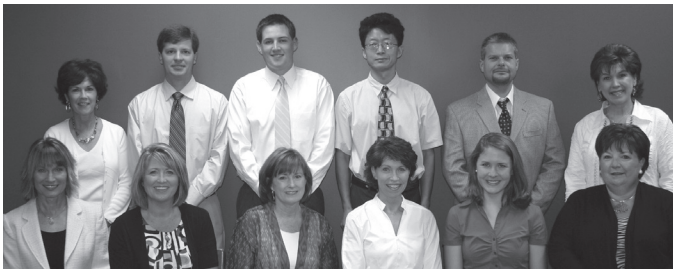
